MEET GREENSBURG, LAST YEAR'S CHAMPIONS
IN IMPORTANT CONTEST.

All roads and trails lead tonight to
Springfield for the big basketball battle
to be staged between Springfield and the
1934 girls' champions, Greensburg.

Indications point to a mammoth crowd
as all Green township expects to be pres-
ent, to say nothing of the loyal Spring-
field followers.

Greensburg girls have won 16 consec-
utive games, having defeated Clinton last
Friday 35 to 18. Springfield has won in
all its games this year, including Tall-
madge, Coventry, Norton, Alumni, and Stow.

Springfield boys, the only undefeat-
ed county league team, are not expecting
a set-up in their part of the evening's
entertainment. Despite the fact that
the Greensburg boys have yet to win a con-
test this year, they are noted for being
a scrappy and clever outfit that must be
watched.

The girls' contest will be played
at 7:30; the boys at 8:30.

CLINTON IS NEXT

The last of three consecutive home
games will be played next Friday, when
the Clinton teams come to Springfield for
their annual battle.

Springfield followers of the cage
sport will remember the disastrous one-
point loss to the Clinton girls last
year in the tournament feature game, won
by Clinton's ability to "Hammer" the lo-
cals for free throws.

R. Hammer, Clinton forward sank 3
field goals and 21 fouls for 27 points,
making her team's total 4--21--29.
Springfield's totals were 12 field goals,
4 fouls for a total of 28 points, the de-
ciding basket being made in the overtime
period.

This will be a real "grudge" battle.

The Clinton boys are likewise devel-
