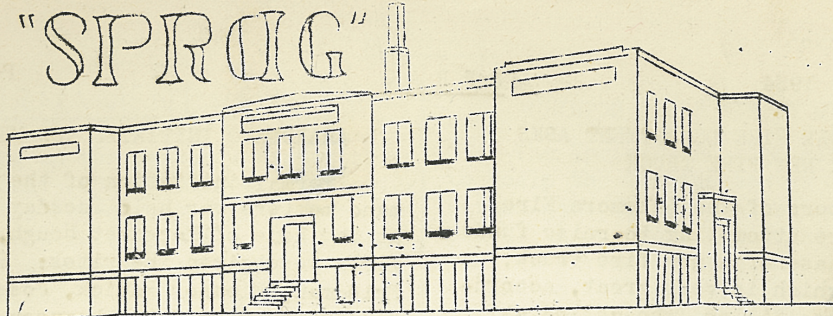

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TOURNAMENT RESULTS

Winding up the season's basketball for all Summit County teams except Springfield and the tournament winners, the annual Class B tourney closed last Saturday night with Coventry again on top. Hudson took second place and Stow third, these three teams going to the district tournament at Kent this week.

The tournament, managed by Prin. J. P. McDowell, of Northfield, opened Wednesday night to a crowd of 700 persons.

Winners of the above games met on Friday night before a packed house estimated at 1000. Giving the crowd its money's worth, Stow triumphed over Bath in an overtime, 31 to 28; Clinton took Richfield, 33 to 32, and Coventry won from Northfield 39 to 26. The last game, Twinsburg vs. Hudson was the feature game of the evening, Hudson vanquishing the league leaders 39 to 32.

In the semi-finals played Saturday afternoon, the race was narrowed down to two teams by Coventry's 27 to 21 victory over Stow, and Hudson's 26 to 24 triumph over Clinton.

In the finals Saturday night, the fast Coventry five won the tournament title by trouncing Hudson 27 to 25. The consolation game was won by Stow over Clinton, 26 to 21.

The tournament was a financial success. After all expenses are paid, each of the sixteen county high schools will receive a nice dividend out of the proceeds of this year and last.

CLINTON GIRLS WIN IN OVERTIME

The Springfield high girls went out to scalp the Clinton sextet in an exhibition game Saturday afternoon, and repeated the performance of a year ago, that of giving Clinton the opportunity to win on foul shots.

R. Hammer, right forward, accomplished the almost unheard-of feat of dropping in 21 out of 29 attempts, winning the game in an overtime period after the regular playing time had ended 24 to 24.

She had tied the score with three consecutive shots during the last minute of the game with the score 24-21 in Springfield's favor.

There was little doubt in the minds of the spectators about the relative merits of the two teams taken as a unit, but as the pay-off is made on the final score, Clinton won.

All three school busses are to make trips to the big party tonight. Come out for the best time you've had.

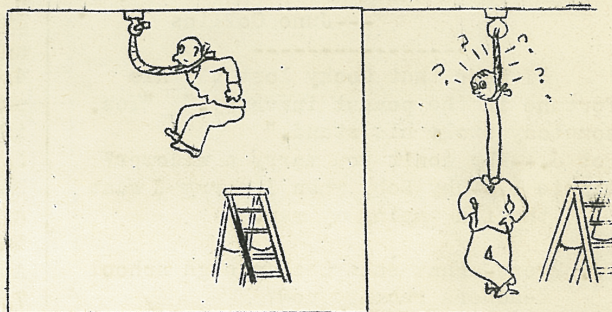
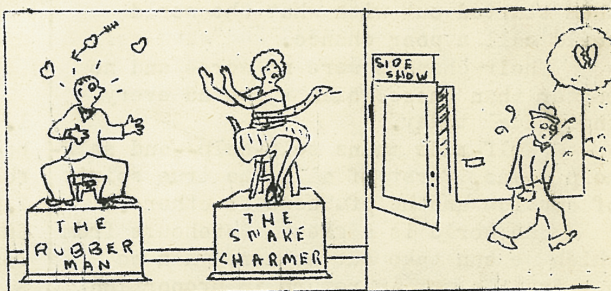
