

Springfield's Red and Grays went down to defeat in the first round of the Kent Tournament, losing to Kent State high school by the score of 25 to 19.

The contest was close thruout the entire game, both teams pre-senting a tight defense, and both missing a number of shots that should have counted. Fouls were frequent, but the local boys failed to register a sufficient number to have saved the game.

In the other Summit county team contests, Northfield lost to Navarre, 37 to 18; Peninsula defeated Atwater 29 to 21; and Coventry walloped Brewster 31 to 19.

Coventry then won all its other games and defeated Waynesburg in the finals for the tournament championship.
