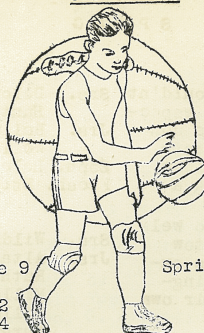
### SPRINGFIELD ELIMINATED FROM CLASS A TOURNAMENT
