COUNTY HIGH PUPILS TAKE HONORS OVER CITY IN CONTEST

With 14 of the 25 highest places to their credit, county high school pupils walked away with the honors in the annual Senior Scholarship Tests held at Central high school, Akron, on Saturday, March 24.

The highest score made was by a Hudson boy, Lawrence Eisenhower, 323 points out of a possible 400.

TAXPAYERS HAVE INTERESTING MEETING

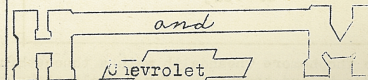
The Lakemore taxpayers meeting at the high school building last Friday night broke up in disorder without being able to take a vote on the question being discussed.
