About this same time another contest was going forward. This was the important duty of choosing a name for our brain-child. The name selected had been turned in anonymously, so the treasury

saved a dollar.
The name "Sprag" stands for Springfield's Red and Gray. The word means to support and keep from sliding back. It applies only to Springfield.
